

THE BRIGHT YOUNG STARS

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Those of you who are younger and like astrology can't imagine how difficult it was to be an astrologer years ago. How could we calculate something as complex as a chart of planetary positions? There were no home computers and not even 4-function calculators until the early 1970s. Imagine that! Everything was done with pencil and paper, ephemerides, and log tables. It was no fun at all.

Computerized astrology finally came along. I should know because I am the one who brought it along, being the first person to program astrology and make those programs available to my fellow astrologers. That was in 1977. But even when we had computer generated charts, you had to be an astrologer to read and interpret them. A dream of mine was to have a computerized astrology program that people who knew nothing of astrology could use.

Today that dream has come true because I worked to make it come true and the name of that program is BlueStar, named after the young bright "O" and "B" stars, those just being born in the heavens. And BlueStar has two modes, one for astrologers and one for everyone else. The mode for non-astrologers includes sixteen complete (and illustrated) astrological reports mostly written by me, including almost all of the ones I sometimes write about here. You can do unlimited reports with them.
